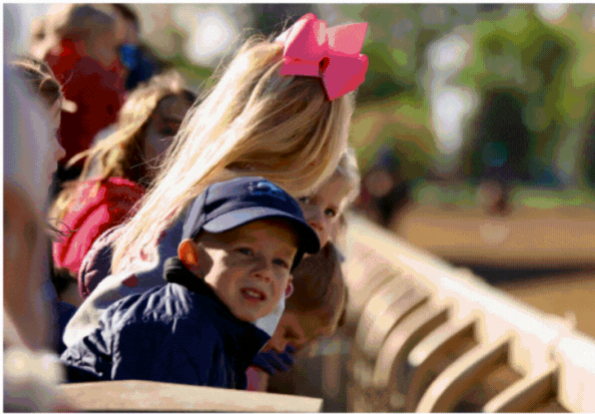




We loved seeing our Kids Club Families this Spring !

DIY **STATIC ELECTRICITY**

Materials
Balloon
Wool Yarn
Confetti

Instructions

1. Blow up the balloon! Make sure it's nice and round.
2. Spread some confetti on a solid flat surface.
3. Rub the balloon quickly and vigorously against the wool for about 30 seconds.
4. Hold the charged balloon close to the confetti on the table.
5. Observe how the confetti pieces jump up and stick to the balloon.

The Science

Everything around us, even you, is made of tiny particles called atoms. These atoms have even tinier parts called electrons, which we can imagine as little balls of electricity. When you rub the balloon on the wool, electrons jump from the wool to the balloon. This makes the balloon negatively charged because it has extra electrons, and the wool positively charged because it has lost some electrons.

Opposites attract! That's why the confetti, which is neutral (not charged), is attracted to the negatively charged balloon. This attraction is similar to how lightning happens in clouds. When different parts of a cloud become charged, the electricity jumps through the air, creating a flash of light - **LIGHTNING!**

EXPERIMENT!

- Try rubbing the balloon on different materials like your hair, a cotton shirt, or a plastic cup. Does the confetti react the same way?
- Can you make the balloon stick to your wall after charging it?
- What happens if you touch the balloon after rubbing it?
